
Friday 24th January; Christians Together

2025 marks the 1700th anniversary of the Council of Nicaea, when Christians from around the world gathered in what is modern Turkey to confront their differences and tensions. There, with joy, they rediscovered their common rootedness in Jesus Christ.

This year we are invited to spend a week reflecting on the story of Martha's confession of faith in Jesus, as narrated in John 11:17-27. Each of us is asked to sit with Jesus' provocative question to Martha: "Do you believe this?"

Praying for each other is surely the first step towards realising Jesus' prayer at the Last Supper; that all those who follow him "might be one". That prayer is partly for Christians to be more effective together in mission, but also because unity *in itself* is a reflection of the glory of our Trinitarian God (*John 17.20ff*).

Father of compassion, renew our faith in you. Bind us closer together through your love, so that we can recognise each other as your children and come together as one. We praise you through Jesus Christ, your only-begotten Son, in the communion of the Holy Spirit. Amen.
